Systemic Framework for Family and Community Engagement

In April 2016, our Departmet presented the concept that a systemic approach to family and community engagement was an important endeavor for our School District to pursue. This type of approach can help ensure that each and every family is empowered to support their student's learning.

Listed below are two of the four strategies our Department will be using to support schools with their family engagement efforts to support student learning.

High Impact Home Strategies

- A simple method in which families can interact with their students
- All families are empowered to support their student's learning at home and in the community
- Directly supports the district learning cycles

What are the High Impact Home Strategies?

Three strategies parents can use at home with their children, no matter what language they speak. The parent learns and uses one strategy at a time, and when finished with one, proceeds to the next.

High Impact Home Strategies provide strategically focused opportunities for parents to:

- o Talk with their child
- o Build their child's vocabulary
- o Read to/with their child
- o Learn how their child is doing in school
- o Learn how to support their children to be responsible for their own learning
- o Help students make the connection between education and their future

Design Thinking

- Is an interactive process that puts family voices front and center
- A workshop which gives families an opportunity to share their hopes and dreams for their children as well as their struggles and barriers to their children's success
- · Is a method that can be used by schools or clusters
- A human-centered approach that provides an opportunity for collaboration among all stakeholders to solve *context-specific* challenges to build trust and take action together
- Educators listen deeply to build empathy for families and students in their community
- Creates an additional investment in partnerships among families, students, educators and community
- Is a process by which, as a result of these partnerships between educators and families, leads to taking action to support student learning

Take a Look at Our Classes on the Common Core State Standards and Smarter Balanced Testing

The Common Core State Standards: What Parents Need to Know:

In this 1 hour class, parents will learn about the Common Core State Standards and the 6 major shifts taking place in English Language Arts and Math.

CCSS-Depth of Knowledge (DOK):

In this 1 hour class, parents will understand how the new standards challenge our students across all subjects. We will look at Webb's Depth of Knowledge and the critical thinking that is being required of all students. Clear examples of STEM questions fro each lever of DOK will be provided.

CCSS-Standards for Mathematical Practice:

In this 1 hour class, parents will learn about the 6 shifts in Math and see examples of shifts in the areas of focus and skills across the grades. We will then concentrate on the 8 standards for mathematical practice and demonstrate how parents can use them to support and engage their students with math at home.

Raising Skilled Readers:

In this 1 hour class, parents will become familiar with techniques for reading non-fiction, including close reading and how to write in response to non-fiction texts.

Smarter Balanced Testing (includes how to interpret scores):

During this 1 hour class, parents will learn how the new State assessments have changed under Common Core. They will learn about the new California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) and Smarter Balanced Testing. We will look at how the test has changed, view sample test questions, learn how the test is scored, and how parents can interpret and understand their student's test results.





One-Hour Workshops

Internet Safety: Keeping Your Child Safe: (English or Spanish)

Parents learn about the risks their children may encounter while accessing the internet, as well as various ways to prevent them from becoming cyber victims. Information about social media and cell phones will also be discussed. (Grades K-12)

(English or Spanish) Parents can help their

Homework Essentials:

Parents can help their children get ready for homework by organizing 3 simple things: time, place, and tools. Preventing homework hassles and solutions to common homework problems will be discussed. (*Grades K-5*)

Discovering the Genres: (English or Spanish)

Parents will discover and explore the 8 main genres and the importance of making sure their children are reading from each one. Participants will also receive a Home Reading Log to keep track of their children's reading progress. (Grades K-5)

21st Century Math: (English or Spanish)

Parents will learn how Math is being taught in the 21st Century. They will experience the standards for mathematical practice firsthand through video clips and group activities. (Grades K-5)

Preparing Students for College and Career: The a-g Requirements: (English or Spanish)

(English or Spanish)
Families will learn at

Families will learn about a-g classes their students will need to take in middle and high school in order to be prepared with essential skills for college and career. It's not too early to plan ahead. (Grades 6-12)

Writing Across the Grades: (English or Spanish)

This class is designed to give parents an overview of the development of writing skills students learn in grades K-5 as they write personal narratives. They will also learn ways in which they can encourage and support writing at home. (*Grades K-5*)

Family Communication: (English or Spanish)

Good communication skills are essential for all families. Parents will learn proven techniques on how to talk to their kids, so they will listen. (Grades K-12)

The Keys to Reading: High Frequency Words or Word Families: (English or Spanish)

This class will focus on key words all students need to know that will boost their reading, and ways to help them become fluent readers. (Grades K-3)

Bullying: (English or Spanish)

In this 1 hour class, parents will gain knowledge of what bullying is and is not, the signs to look for that your child is being bullied, steps to take if your child is being bullied, and what to do if it is your child who is the bully.

Academic Support Classes Available:

Great Beginnings for Kinder: (English or Spanish)

In this 3 to 6-session class, parents will understand various skills their children will learn throughout the school year. We will focus on how to read nonfiction books, shared reading at home, practicing key math concepts, building good study habits through homework, and developing writing skills. (Grade K)

Help Your Child Improve in Reading: (English or Spanish)

In this 3-session class, parents will learn ways to help their children develop a love of books and increase their reading level through a variety of activities. (*Grades K-5*)

Writing Family Stories: (English or Spanish)

In this 4-session class, parents will learn about different types of writing: poetry, biographies, letters, while creating a family album featuring photos from home and their own class writings. (Grades 2-5)

Passport to Success: (English or Spanish)

In this 3-session class, parents will learn study skills to help their students develop strong study habits to build success in school, such as how to take notes, study for tests and organize their time. (*Grades 5-12*)

Get Your Child Organized for Homework: (English or Spanish)

This 3-session class helps parents maximize their children's time for completing homework. This includes suggestions as to what to do when your child does not want to do homework and planning for an effective parent-teacher conference. Parents will receive a Homework Tool Kit in the second class. (Grades 1-5)

Reading to Learn: (English or Spanish)

In this 2-session class, parents will learn how to boost their children's reading comprehension using strategies such as making predictions and connections, and questioning. (*Grades 3-5*)

Mathematics Today: (English or Spanish)

This 4-session class helps parents understand how Math is being taught differently today. Parents will learn that problem solving, cooperative learning and modeling with mathematics is the approach, instead of memorization and worksheets. (*Grades K-5*)

Destination College: (English or Spanish)

In this 4-session class, parents will learn the value of motivating their kids to attend college and how to prepare them for this experience. Topics covered include: myths about college, high school graduation/a-g university requirements, financial aid, goal setting and more. (Grades 4-12)





Parenting Classes Available:

Parents Growing Together (PGT): (English or Spanish)

PGT consists of 6-sessions: These classes help parents learn skills such as communication, consistency in parenting through the ABC Method to improve discipline techniques, and how to raise cooperative children. (Birth-Age 12)

Second Step: (English or Spanish)

Second Step consists of 5-sessions: These classes help families teach their children how to identify feelings and care for others using empathy. They will learn to manage anger and what to do about it using three steps: 1) How do I feel? 2) What is the problem? and, 3) What can I do? When children learn these problem solving steps at a young age, they learn how to manage anger for life. (*Grades K-5*)

Can We Talk?: (English or Spanish)

Can We Talk? consists of 5-sessions. These classes help parents improve their communication with their children. They will learn how to have conversations about feelings, self-esteem, peer pressure, mixed messages and human sexuality. (Grades K-12)

Guiding Good Choices: (English or Spanish)

These 5-session classes are designed to help parents strengthen family bonds while reducing the risk factors associated with substance abuse and addictive behaviors. Many students in grades 7 and 8 try drugs or alcohol for the first time and of those, 1 in 2 may become addicted. Parents will learn how to establish clear expectations for behavior and manage family conflict to help their children make better choices. (*Grades 4-9*)



Parent Leadership Classes Available:

Site Governance Team training:

Did you know that all San Diego Unified schools are required to have a Governance Team (SGT/PGT)? The San Diego Education Association (SDEA), in conjunction with our Department, has a 1 hour workshop as a review of the SGT process. It provides an overview of the focus and purpose of the Governance Team, and looks at the difference between a Governance Team and the School Site Council (SSC). We will address issues such as scheduling, staffing, budgeting, decisions related to instructional programs, and other specific areas identified in the SDEA Contract.

School smarts:

School smarts is a 7-week fee based program created by the California State PTA where parents and family members learn the value of getting involved in their children's education.

School Site Responsibilities

- ✓ Recruit a minimum of 25 parents for each class.
 - Please note that typically 2/3 of parents who register for workshops actually attend.
 - Classes of less than 15 enrolled parents may be cancelled or may need to be rescheduled.
- ✓ Provide childcare in a separate room. (This is very important!)
 - Your school's Title I funds can be used to help pay for this service.
- ✓ Make SchoolMessenger calls to parents and send home weekly reminders to maintain class enrollment. A sample script is provided for you on the next page.
- ✓ Provide a room with tables and chairs for group work.
- ✓ Provide a document camera with projector and screen.
- ✓ Provide chart paper and/or easel or whiteboard with markers.

Project Ujima is designed to strengthen existing resources within African American families in the San Diego Unified School District. Project Ujima was founded in 2009 and is named for the third principle of Kwanzaa, collective work and responsibility.

Topics are culturally focused and provide resources designed to support African American families in improving the academic, social and behavioral environment within the family and community.

A UNIQUE TEACHING TOOL ABOUT THE MONTFORD POINT MARINES

The Montford Point Marines were the first African Americans to serve in the United States Marine Corps following President Franklin Roosevelt's 1941 Executive Order 8802 requiring the U.S. military to recruit and enlist African Americans. Despite horrendous discrimination at home and within the ranks of the military, the Montford Point Marines served with honor and distinction.



Project Ujima parents, students and community members have chronicled the historical and contemporary significance of the **Montford Point Marines** to San Diego and the United States' history and culture through digital stories and a play.

Three of the original **Montford Point Marines** who reside in San Diego were interviewed about their experience in the Marines in the 1940s. Also interviewed were current, former and retired Marines. "The Legacies of Pride" is a one act play depicting some of the experiences of the original **Montford Point Marines**. Both the interviews and the play were digitally recorded. Both DVDs are available for **free** to use as a teaching tool at district schools.

COMPUTER CLASSES

Computers are a part of our students' learning at all grades. It is important that parents have the computer skills necessary to support their child's learning at home and to ensure their safety online. Therefore, we are offering FREE computer training classes for parents at your school.



We will need access to the school's computer lab to be able to offer these classes.

Computer Basics Level 1

In these 5-session classes, parents will become familiar with the different types of computers, their components, using the keyboard correctly, and learn basic Microsoft applications. These classes are designed for parents new to computers.

Computer Basics Level 2

This is the follow up class to Computer Basics 1. Parents who wish to take this class must complete Computer Basics Level 1, or have basic computer skills. *Choose from any or all of the following computer classes:*

Internet Safety

Parents will learn ways to monitor their children's use of the Internet and ideas on how to keep them safe.

• Email

In this hands-on class, parents will learn to set up a free email address in order to facilitate communication with school staff.

PowerSchool Parent Portal

Parents will learn to use the district's PowerSchool Parent Portal, a web-based application that allows parents to monitor their student's attendance, grades, test scores and other important information.

We're helping families develop a daily FUN ritual of reading books together!

What is Raising a Reader?

Raising a Reader is a fee based exciting program that engages teachers, parents and children in reading at home to support family literacy and improve student learning outcomes. Raising A Reader (RAR) is a national nonprofit organization that has helped families successfully build and sustain literacy routines in their homes since 1999. RAR has served over 1 million children and families, nearly 75% of whom lived at or below the poverty level, and more than half of whom were English language learners.

Currently, we serve 15 schools and have expanded the program to first grades for a total of 87 classrooms and over 2,000 students. RAR is at Adams, Burbank, Carver, Central, Cherokee Point, Chollas-Mead, Clay, Franklin, Horton, Jefferson, Johnson, Joyner, Rodriguez, Rowan, and Sherman.

How Does the Program Work?

Raising A Reader rotates bright red canvas bags filled with award-winning books into children's homes on a weekly basis, exposing children on average to 75 different books per rotation cycle. **RAR** pairs this book rotation with parent training and information on how to effectively share books by creating a family ritual of daily reading in the home. Family support in daily reading helps children to increase their vocabulary, develop language and literacy skills, learn both common and uncommon information—all while instilling a love of learning.

RAR provides the following:



- 1) **High quality books**, a parent video offering tips on reading aloud (with a built in selection of 14 home languages), and sturdy book bags for each student to take home.
- 2) **Teacher training**, and all materials needed to manage the classroom book rotation.
- 3) Training to help parents learn more ways to fully support their child's literacy development at home, including ways to actively boost their child's brain development through daily reading.
- 4) **Public Library Link**: families are connected with their local public library to encourage them to continue the ritual of borrowing books to read at home.

GREAT Beginnings is a series of 6 FREE workshops for parents of Kindergarten students to help parents understand what skills their children will need to learn by the end of their first year in school. The goal is to get parents involved early in their education so children can be successful in school and beyond!

The topics covered in the workshops include:

- 1. **Be a VIP: A Very Involved Parent:** When parents are involved in their children's education, children do better in school. Learn the different ways you can support your child at school and at home.
- 2. **Essential Homework Tools:** Successful students have strong study habits. Learn about a special place, special tools and special time for doing homework.
- 3. **Shared Reading:** Learn strategies such as "asking important questions" to increase your child's critical thinking skills.
- 4. **Reading Nonfiction Books:** Learn the importance of reading non-fiction books and how reading is connected to the Common Core State Standards.
- 5. **Family Math:** Early experiences can determine how your child looks at mathematics for the rest of his or her life. This workshop is designed to give you ideas and resources to support your role in your child's math education.
- 6. **Ideas to Encourage Family Writing:** Writing is a developmental process. You will learn how to help your child put his thoughts on paper to become a stronger writer.

Classes are 1 1/2 hours long and are presented in English or Spanish. Parents will receive free books, homework toolkits, math games, materials and a certificate of completion. To schedule workshops contact:

Southeast Asian, Pacific Islander and African Parent Education

Serving Immigrant and Refugee Families

The Parent Education Program provides parent workshops and trainings on topics specifically designed for Southeast Asian, Pacific Islander and Somali families. Workshops have interpretation services in a variety of languages, including Karen and Burmese.

The goals of the workshops are to:

Share with participants the value of parent involvement and how to partner with the schools

Reinforce their family values and beliefs in education

Provide families with information about the American school system

Increase the engagement and involvement of parents in their children's education

Workshops and training classes are organized in the morning and evenings for different language groups.

Workshops are offered on the following topics:

- 1. **Accessing School Information:** Key personnel, programs, school policies, problem solving, parent rights/responsibilities, and school/student issues.
- 2. **Supporting Learning at Home:** Study skills, helping with homework, monitoring TV, and utilizing after school activities such as tutoring and student clubs.
- 3. **Building a Home-School Partnership:** Parent-teacher conferences, being involved at schools, cultural activities and ethnic celebrations that support school success.
- 4. **Transitioning to Middle School:** The structure, what your middle school has to offer, changes in behavior, warning signs of academic trouble, and how to be involved.
- 5. **Planning for Success after High School**: Dropout prevention, A-G graduation requirements, college entrance, and community service opportunities.

American Indian Education Title VII Program

For four decades, the Indian Education Program has reached out to support and address the unique educational and cultural needs of urban American Indian and Alaskan Native students who attend school in San Diego. The program serves students of Native heritage from Pre-K through high school. Some of the academic services offered are:

- Tutoring and Mentoring
- · Dropout prevention counseling
- · Parent-teacher consultations
- Monitoring of student grades and attendance
- · College scholarship application assistance



Students also receive enrichment activities in history, traditions, and cultural and artistic heritage. Our goal is to help our American Indian/Alaska Native students succeed in school, graduate and enroll in college.

Program Eligibility: All American Indian and Alaskan Native students enrolled in the San Diego Unified School District are eligible to participate in the Indian Education Program once a 506 form (Online at web address below) is completed. The 506 form is an official, federal document from the Office of Indian Education used to enroll students in the Indian Education Program.



Counseling and Tutorial Services



In collaboration with Southern California American Indian Resource (SCAIR) Center, our services are available to ALL students by appointment.

Counseling services provided for individual, family & career counseling.

Tutorial services provide assistance in math, reading, writing, social studies and science from introductory to advanced for all subjects. We also help with GED/Diploma prep, college prep, standardized testing, scholarships and financial aid. Tutoring will be held Monday through Wednesday afternoons.



On June 15, 2012, the Secretary of Homeland Security announced that people who came to the United States as children and met several key guidelines could request consideration of deferred action status for a period of two years, subject to renewal, and would then be eligible for work authorization. Only individuals who can prove through verifiable documentation that they meet these guidelines will be considered for deferred action know as DACA (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals).

Individuals who are applying for DACA and need school documents must make an appointment in person or call the district DACA Office. We can only provide documents for students who attended schools in the San Diego Unified School District they must bring an original birth certificate and a picture ID. If you are requesting documents for another person, 18 years or older, you must bring a signed letter granting you permission to do so. Bring your picture ID. Parents must request the documents for their minor children, ages 15 to 17.
